New Superintendent Kevin McCormack speaks on hope, sacrifice, and resilience of Catholic schools

Deacon Kevin McCormack, the new Superintendent of Schools for the Diocese of Brooklyn, says he ought to be "in the 58th grade by now." After a lifetime of Catholic schooling, entering his religious vocation as Deacon, and creating a legacy as principal at Xaverian High School, Deacon McCormack is ready to lead our Catholic school community into a new era of hope, reimagination, and togetherness.

Deacon McCormack is excited to integrate his continued passion for Catholic education into his new role. "The Brooklyn Diocese has so many great things going for it," he said enthusiastically. "Together with Bishop Brennan and working with Dr. Chadzutko, really building on what he and

his team did, I think the best is yet to come. I think we're going to see dramatic and dynamic things happening. We will trust in the Holy Spirit, be rooted in strong academics, good discipline, and our Catholic identity."

While inspired and motivated to lead the diocesan schools in Brooklyn & Queens, Deacon McCormack also acknowledged the tremendous need across our Catholic community. With school tuition on the rise, it is often difficult for our parents to keep up with payments, turning their child's education into an unknown. "There's a mom who's cleaning the dishes in her kitchen, and she's crying because her husband is working three jobs," Deacon McCormack voiced. "She's watching her young kids and dreaming about where they're going to go to school. She's wondering how she's going to do it. She's saying a prayer right now, 'Lord, show me how I can get my kids into Catholic school.' Our *Angel* donors answer the prayer."



Deacon McCormack reemphasized the need for support in our Catholic school community. Our *Angels* are some of the most inspiring people in our community, and they show just how much they care about the sacrifice needed to provide a child with a Catholic education. He encourages all members of our Brooklyn and Queens Catholic school community to stay involved.

"Get involved with your schools, even with your alma mater," he said. "Join a school board, represent your graduating elementary class, sponsor a student. But most importantly," he said, "tell your Catholic education story."

"Tell the story of how Catholic school kids, when they go to college, they're ahead of their peers. Tell the story of the sacrifice that your parents made for you, and you made for your kids. We need to remind people of the impact and the only way we do that is through the stories."


