How Caleb, an 8th grader at Divine Wisdom Catholic Academy, defines gratitude

No one knows this sacrifice better than Andrea, *Angel* scholarship recipient and parent of Caleb. Andrea immigrated to the U.S. from the Caribbean, with hopes for a better life she could build for her family. Her son, Caleb, was born in the U.S., and Andrea and her husband knew they wanted him in a Catholic school to receive the best education. Caleb has spent his elementary years at Divine Wisdom Catholic Academy in Queens, learning about what he loves the most- science.

My favorite subject is science because I think it's so interesting to learn about biology and mechanics," Caleb, now an 8th grader, said enthusiastically. Divine Wisdom's STEM program has deepened Caleb's curiosity for all things mechanics and construction.

In 2016, Caleb's dad passed away. Andrea knew that continuing without him would be difficult. "As a single mom, I knew how hard the rest of my life would be. I did my best to cut anything out of my expenses to fit Caleb's school in, even cutting the cable bill, just so he could stay at Divine Wisdom." Andrea worked hard, together with Caleb's grandmother, to make sure nothing changed in his education. Caleb's *Angel* eased the financial burden.

When asked about what gratitude means to him, Caleb mentioned how it's not just about helping people in need. "It's about giving back," he said. Caleb often helps younger students with their homework at Divine Wisdom. He also makes sure no student is left out, and that someone always has a friend to play with. "Caleb just got accepted to Xaverian High School!" Andrea added, "We are very excited for him; this is where I want him to go." Caleb feels well prepared for high school, mentioning how Divine Wisdom has shaped him to be the best person he can be. "Divine Wisdom gave me confidence to know I can achieve anything," Caleb added.

"The Angel Program changed my life, and my son's even more so," Andrea expressed in gratitude.

Donating food items, or making lunch for those of service or in great need




Visiting senior centers, and writing letters of thanks or support to veterans, other service members, or children who are sick and struggling

When we first applied for Futures in Education, it was a very dark time for us. My husband, at the age of 44, got diagnosed with Stage IV Colon Cancer, and was given less than one year to live. Rosa was 4.5 years old. I knew without my life-long partner, my financial provider, I wouldn't be able to send Rosa and my younger child, Raffaella, to a Catholic school.

The Principal at St. Bernard mentioned that I should apply to Futures in Education for an Angel Scholarship. I did. And for the past seven years, we have received Angel Scholarships.

Next year, Rosa starts a new chapter in her life. She will be attending St. Edmund's Preparatory High School. I still can't believe it; she is actually going to High School. My husband is gone eight and half years, there is not a day that goes by that I don't miss him and wish he could be here for all the milestones my girls have reached.

I feel saying thank you, and how much I appreciate what the Angel Scholarships has done for me and my girls is so little compared to what I feel in my heart.
